<sup>11</sup> But when Christ came as a high priest of the good things that have come, then through the greater and perfect tent (not made with hands, that is, not of this creation), <sup>12</sup>he entered once for all into the Holy Place, not with the blood of goats and calves, but with his own blood, thus obtaining eternal redemption. <sup>13</sup>For if the

blood of goats and bulls, with the sprinkling of the ashes of a heifer, sanctifies those who have been defiled so that their flesh is purified, <sup>14</sup>how much more will the blood of Christ, who through the eternal Spirit offered himself without blemish to God, purify our conscience from dead works to worship the living God!

**Gospel Lesson: Mark 12:28-34**

*The Reader reads a lesson from the Gospel of Mark*

<sup>28</sup> One of the scribes came near and heard them disputing with one another, and seeing that he answered them well, he asked him, ‘Which commandment is the first of all?’ <sup>29</sup>Jesus answered, ‘The first is, “Hear, O Israel: the Lord our God, the Lord is one; <sup>30</sup>you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength.” <sup>31</sup>The second is this, “You shall love your neighbour as yourself.” There is no other commandment greater than these.’ <sup>32</sup>Then the scribe said to him, ‘You are right, Teacher; you have truly said that “he is one, and besides him there is no other”; <sup>33</sup>and “to love him with all the heart, and with all the understanding, and with all the strength”, and “to love one’s neighbour as oneself”,—this is much more important than all whole burnt-offerings and sacrifices.’ <sup>34</sup>When Jesus saw that he answered wisely, he said to him, ‘You are not far from the kingdom of God.’ After that no one dared to ask him any question.

## Heritage Sunday:

Today is our designated **Heritage Sunday in the Diocese of Easton**, established to remember our particular history in the life of our Diocese.

The Diocese of Easton was created on October 12, 1868 through action by the General Convention. Prior to that, it had been a part of the Diocese of Maryland. However, the physical distance from the bigger cities of the Diocese (Baltimore and Washington) and the availability of the Bishop for visitation contributed to the desire of the Eastern Shore churches to separate from the Diocese. Easton was chosen as the namesake and the seat of the Diocese, as it was the largest city on the Eastern Shore. In November of 1868, the first Diocesan convention was held in which Henry C. Lay, Missionary Bishop of Arkansas, was elected the first Bishop of the Diocese of Easton, on the fourth ballot.

St. Paul's by-the-Sea in Ocean City began as a mission church of St. Paul's, Berlin, holding summer services beginning in 1878 led by the Rector of St. Paul's. The earliest services were held in the Congress Hall Hotel, whose site is now the Ocean City inlet!

In 1898, a Mr. John Waggaman gave two lots at Baltimore and Third Street for the construction of a church. Mr. Waggaman was an investor in many of the early Ocean City enterprises, and even served as Mayor from 1902 - 1903. The cornerstone for the parish was laid on June 6, 1900, and the first service was held on June 7, 1901. The church was designated a mission church until 1920, when it was recognized as an independent parish in the Diocese of Easton.

Since that time in 1920, St. Paul's by-the-Sea has remained at the corner of 3<sup>rd</sup> and Baltimore. Our history has been marked by tragedy and grace, conflict and resolution. We are excited and hopeful as we enter 2022.

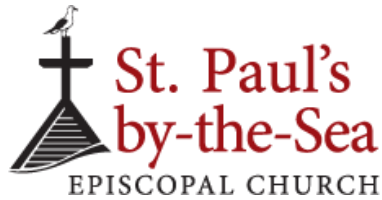
